HAMO CHEVERE was fined 60 marks, in 1238, for striking a servant of King Henry 111. - Biomefield's Norfolk, x. 60, 61; xi. 235.





COAT OF ARMS. EDWARD CHEVERS, Esq., of Macciown, was treated by James II., August 23, 1630. Viscount Mount Leinster, in the county of Carlow, and Baron Bannow, in the county of Wax-ford.
